WIAA expresses concern

● Profanity problems need to be resolved

Recently I received a letter from Mr. Frank McCormick, Assistant Director of the W.I.A.A., concerning the use of profanity during the Spring State Tournaments. This seems to be a continuing problem year after year and he hopes that the State Golf Coaches Association can suggest some possibilities of rectifying this situation. As Mr. McCormick stated, "Some people came away from our State Golf Tournaments with an extremely bad taste in their mouths because of the behavior of some of our golfers. It is unfortunate that this behavior, most of the time, goes unpunished."

Simply put, this situation cannot continue. Golf is a sport where rules and etiquette play as important a role as hitting the

our problem are possible and your State Golf Coaches Executive Committee will be discussing them at our Fall meeting. However, for the sake of discussion, let me put forth some of my ideas. Please feel free to respond as your input is most important in this matter.

Solutions to this breach of etiquette should begin "at the top" with all golf coaches. As the head of the golf program at our schools, we play a major role in determining the success of the program through our rules, regulations, and expectations. Success is not determined solely through wins and losses, but it is also based on how successful each player becomes in relation to their potential. Developing golfers who know and understand rules and golf etiquette and are playing up to their potential is part of our responsibility as coaches. By expecting our golfers to know the rules behave according to proper golf etiquette, we become more successful in creating the opportunity for these young

men to reach their potential as golfers and as young adults. If our expectations are low, i.e. not caring how our golfers look or act in public, playing winter rules everywhere on all golf courses because we play that way, only practicing three days a week, etc. will prevent golfers from reaching their full potential. The first solution begins with us. If we know the rules and golf etiquette, then we can expect it from our golfers and many of our problems will disappear.

A second solution might involve waiving of Rule 8.1 for all W.I.A.A. competition. This rule states "A player shall not give advice to anyone in the competition except his partner. A player may ask for advice from only his partner or either of their caddies." Waiving of this rule would allow coaches to do what they are hired to do—COACH! The N.C.A.A. allows their coaches to coach during competition on the course, as do a number of high school conferences around the State, with much success. By allowing all high school competition this leeway, coaches could be on the course with a purpose, and our presence should do much to deter improper etiquette.

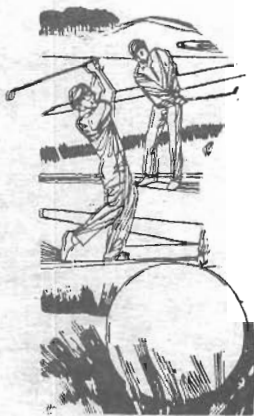
