President's Corner:

Changes Coming At State Tournament

April 12, 1994

Dear Golf Coaches:

The intent of this letter is to address two important issues, namely membership in our association and the WIAA tournament pairing for 1994.

On the subject of membership, we currently have 220 coaches who are members of our group. Another 50, who were members a year ago, still have not sent in their registration for this year, and 15 others who were members in 1992 have not joined.

There are still about one hundred schools who sponsor golf that have coaches who either don't know about the WWSGCA or have chosen not to be a part of it.

If you know of someone who coaches golf and is not a member (he/she should have a red bag tag), please extend an invitation to join us. You can have them call or write to me at Kewaskum High School or information about becoming a member.

Starting with the WIAA spring golf regional tournaments, there will be a new format for determining pairings. The tournament director will use a pre-determined order to pair players by school.

Four schools will have their Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 players going out together.

Example: Madison West, Madison East, Madison LaFollette, Beloit, Madison Memorial, Janesville Craig, Janesville Parker and Sun Prairie are assigned to Division 1 regional. In one group will be the Beloit, Craig, East and LaFollette No. 5 players, followed by the group of No. 4, then 3s, and so on then 2s, which would constitute the first five foursomes.

The players from the other four schools will be assigned to the next five foursomes.

If there is an odd number of schools, then three-somes will be formed.

No group will have two players from the same school.

This will make it much easier

for coaches to keep track of their players at practice and on the course. If your team plays early or late you can arrive at the appropriate time and can leave when your team has completed play and scoring requirements.

On still another subject, you will find enclosed the application for the annual meeting and summer clinic. We are returning to University Ridge for this event on June 20. Please be prompt in returning your registrations because space is limited.

WISCONSIN HIGH SCHOOL GOLF COACHES ASSOCIATION

Minutes from the Executive Board Meeting

March 19, 1994

The meeting was called to order by President Joe Harlow at 9:06 a.m. at Cherokee Country Club. Kaz read the minutes from the fall 1993 meeting which were subsequently approved unanimously after a motion from Ernie Niemann with a second from Chuck Menzel.

T.J. Dieck gave the treasurers report indicating that we are as economically sound as we were last year at this time. With a couple of checks not listed, the balance was approximately \$4970.00. Motion to approve report by Ken Kessenich, seconded by Ernie Niemann and passed unanimously.

The W.I.A.A. report was given by Joe Harlow and Kaz. Joe gave a report on the upcoming state tournament series. He also passed out the results of a previous W.I.A.A. coaching survey showing that while 29% of the state coaches favored not allowing coaching on the course, 71% now favor some form of coaching on the course, either the present rule or coaching anywhere. Kaz reported that He and Carl Urfs, Executive Director of the Golf Foundation of Wisconsin met with Deb Hauser and W.I.A.A. Executive Director Doug Chickering a couple of weeks earlier to discuss the state tournament and found the W.I.A.A. staff very enthusiastic about the move to University Ridge and the changes involved including a new pairing format and the use of a double cross-over tee system. Additionally, the W.I.A.A. will secure and assign practice tee times for the state qualifiers on Sunday, and assign practice range spots and times before both Monday's first round and Tuesday's second round. The W.I.A.A. has also indicated that they would like to make available a souvenir program to all qualifiers. It would appear that the 1994 W.I.A.A. boy's state tournament will be the best one ever. W.I.S.A.A. boy's and W.I.A.A. girl's will have the same excitement to look forward to in their fall tournaments. Don Marx,

who works at University Ridge during the summer months indicated that the course has a policy prohibiting bluejeans and tee shirts and may have a policy against any kind of denim pants. Coaches should be aware of this.

Dennis Tiziani gave the Golf Foundation of Wisconsin report indicating that Art Weller, former Titleist salesman, was now the president, with Dick Pearse and Arnold Walker serving as vice presidents, Dick Roellig as secretary and Tom Strong as treasurer. The Golf Foundation is picking up the tab for the two state high school tournament rounds for W.I.A.A. boys and girls and W.I.S.A.A. boys. In addition, they are again running the PGA/GFW Junior Tour with 12 events over the summer months in various parts of the state. They also run the season ending GFW Invitational at Lake Arrowhead. The GFW is actively involved in a number of junior golf activities and is also fund raising to support those events.

Dennis Tiziani also gave a brief N.C.A.A. Division 1 report indicating that college coaches were limited to 144 coaching days. The NCAA Men's Tournament will be held at Stone Bridge in McKinney, Texas in June. Dennis is happy to report that there are many more good high school players in Wisconsin now as compared with 10 years ago. He also reported that plans were being finalized to bring in a Nike Tour event for 1995 to be played at the newly opened Bishop's Bay course west of Madison. Dennis finished with a brief report on the upcoming spring men's and women's season at the university.

Gene Haas gave a brief WSGA report, passed out the Wisconsin Amateur Golfer's Newsletter, an excellent report, and then reported that he had just returned from Florida where, among other things, he had attended a big college golf tournament where several coaches told him that Wisconsin was becoming a "real hotbed of

golf." That comment says much for all involved in golf in this state. Gene also reported that the WSGA State Junior would be held at Brown Deer Golf Course in August and that the U.S.G.A. Boy's Junior qualifier would be conducted at Chenequa C.C.

Steve Stephens then gave the NCAA Division 2 & 3 report indicating that the division 2 championship would be conducted in June at Jacksonville's Harbor Club. He also pointed out again with much distress that only 2 State Universities were still fielding men's golf teams, Eau Claire and Stevens Point, and there were no state Universities fielding women's teams. In light of the comments made to Gene Haas in Florida it seems that the state may begin moving in the other direction within a few years unless we are able to convince the powers to be that both men's and women's golf need to be revived. Unfortunately it seems that the stupid move by the University at Whitewater to drop both programs is now filtering down into the high school program because the local school board voted to drop golf. It was later revived only after a local sugar daddy was found to sponsor the program provided that he would not have to pay for a coach. Thus a parent volunteer now heads the program. Is this going to be the wave of the future? A motion was made by T.J. Dieck and seconded by Don Marx to have our president send a letter to the Whitewater School Board expressing our concern over their failure to provide for a quality golf program for the district. Passed unanimously.

Joe Harlow asked for volunteers to make up a permanent committee to set up and run the February Clinic instead of throwing the burden on Kaz and Steve Hird most years. Marybeth Nienhaus, who ran the clinic in 1993 and Dave Blake volunteered to take on this responsibility. Kaz made a motion to this effect which was seconded by T.J. Dieck and was then

passed unanimously. Marybeth and Dave will be looking into the possibility of using different sites, or going every other year, or of changing to a Saturday, or of going to a different time of year. Things may also stay the same. We are most confident that both Marybeth and Dave will come up with some very exciting clinics in future years!

Don Marx will head up a raffle to be conducted at the annual meeting at University Ridge. Benefits to the GFW.

The board will next meet in Madison on June 19th. The all state players selection committee will meet earlier in the day to try and establish a recommended list to be approved or altered by the entire board. Next years spring board meeting will be held one week earlier after a motion was made to that affect by T.J. Dieck, seconded by Dick McKichan and passed unanimously. It was Kris McKichan who made what seems to be an excellent suggestion. T.J. also made a motion to

move our fall board meeting to Sunday, October 16th at 12:00 noon. Ulrich Adams seconded and the motion passed 16-2.

Dave Blake passed out a brochure featuring "**Golf Smart**" videos available to us at a 20% discount. Kaz also spoke about two other fund raising ventures that are available to high school golf coaches. (See article in this edition)

Kris McKichan then reported on the annual awards presented by our association. There were no nominations for inclusion into the WSHGCA coaches Hall of Fame which, by the way, is located at the WSGA offices in Brookfield. Approved as recipients of the PGA Friend of High School Golf awards for 1993-94 are Rob Muranyi of the Monona Golf Course, and Dewey DuPoint of the Hartford C.C. Being named as recipients of the Friend of High School Golf award for 1993-1994 school year are the Meadow Springs Golf Club in Jefferson, Barb and Pat Meeker, owners of the Oak

Ridge Golf Course in Milton, and Towne Country Club in Edgerton. Congratulations to these **Very Special** people and clubs, and please accept our thanks for helping kids! The recipients will be invited to our annual meeting in June to receive their plaques. Steve Hird made the motion to pay for the day for each recipient with a second by Bob Lehninger. If those being honored wish to bring a friend or spouse, they will be responsible for any costs over and above their own which the WSHGCA is picking up. Passed unanimously.

Ulrich Adams then made a motion to adjourn. Seconded by Ernie Niemann. Passed unanimously at 12:34. This was our shortest meeting ever!

Reflections on Augusta

Have you ever been to Augusta during Master's week? It is quite an experience! My wife and I joined a former assistant coach, now retired, and his wife for Tuesday's practice round at this year's tournament. We arrived at 7:05 am and drove into a parking lot already 2/3 full. Moving quickly to make sure we could get in, we bought our tickets at \$15 per ticket and got in line to await the 8:00 am gate opening. (Parking, by the way, is free!) There were already five long lines of people awaiting the opening of the course to spectators. There seemed to be people from all over the country waiting anxiously for a look at the course, but the majority said "you all" frequently.

Few blue jeans were seen, for these were the true dedicated golfers of America, dressed as real players dress, with Masters green being the predominate color, especially among the females. Everyone was extremely friendly as they discussed the possible 1994 Masters winners with those in line around them. Everyone was extremely polite and friendly. How different from attending other sporting events! One could almost guess that probably 90% or more of the spectators were well educated.

At precisely 8:00 am, the Pinkerton guards began allowing the golf fans to enter the Augusta National course. Entering the grounds, we were amazed at the changes since our last visit to Augusta six years ago. The press

facilities, formerly in an old army barrack styled buildings, were now in beautiful new accommodations designed just for the. The old spectator pro shop, just a large tent, was now in a new building. But everything was still painted green. At the Masters, everything is green, except the flowers, the flags and the food. We tried to move quickly through the crowd heading for the practice area, but when we arrived, the bleachers were already full and lines had formed among those still wanting to watch the players practice. We decided to walk onto the course. It is my strong recommendation on your initial visit that you walk the entire course first to really appreciate the great job Dr. Alister MacKenzie and Bobby Jones Jr did in designing this great course. You will notice that everything seems to be the exact same shade of green. There is nothing out of place. The turf looks as if it had been cut with a pair of scissors.

This being our fourth visit to the Masters, we proceeded to hole 13 where we took a spot in bleachers overlooking the green and the fourteenth tee. We waited three hours for the first players to appear. The alternative, following a group was impossible for the crowd was over 60,000. You sat in bleachers if you were lucky, or you stood along side a fairway if you were unlucky. As the players came through, each received an appreciative round of applause from the fans. Some players, jerks, ignored the crowd. Others, the classy players like Watson, Stewart, etc

thanked the crowd. But only one man received a standing ovation during the practice round, Arnold Palmer. Boy, down here he is still the "king." Players whose finer days have passed them by, like Doug Ford, Jerry Barber and Billy Casper still played the practice round to be seen and appreciated by the fans and also because who would say no to playing Augusta National. As former champions they are invited every year to compete, but they usually limit their golf to the Monday through Wednesday practice rounds.

The thirteenth hole at Augusta has to be the most spectacularly beautiful hole in golf. Pictures and TV do not do it justice. But, by 3:30 it was time to head towards the car. Earlier we sent the wives for sandwiches for lunch. The prices range from \$1 to \$2.50. They do not rip off the fans at the Masters. Very few drink beer, I saw nobody the entire day with a beer! Every fan is polite and very golf knowledgeable. It was difficult to leave but after a brief stop in one of the spectator pro shops for a couple of souvenirs, we were in the car, out onto Washington Avenue and heading toward I-20. I sure hope it won't be another six years before our next visit to this shrine of golf!
