On the Inside:

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The Practice Tee

Shaping Your Shots

Generally, most golfers like to shape or curve their shots left to right or right to left. For a right-handed golfer a right to left shaped shot is called a draw or a hook depending on the amount the ball turns in flight. Conversely, a shot that turns left to right is called a fade or slice, again depending upon the amount the ball curves. What are the advantages and disadvantages of each?

For the right to left shot or draw, a shot which starts right of the target then moves laterally not more than five yards towards the target, the advantages include longer shots which are produced by a correct inside the target line to down the target line forward clubpath motion. Also, this type of shot will generally have a lower trajectory allowing the wind to have less effect than any other type of shot. It is important for the golfer to have a neutral grip. Having a strong grip will require the player to hold or block the natural release of the clubface preventing a draw. Additionally, the player's head must be positioned behind the ball until impact so the clubface will naturally square up to the target under the chin, but since the ball is forward of the chin, the clubface will begin to close just prior to striking the ball thus insuring a soft draw. The major disadvantage with a draw or hook is that the ball can be uncontrollable. However, using a modern high spin golf ball allows a draw to be as easily controlled as a fade. A hooked ball is almost always an undesirable shot as even with high spin balls the curvature is too exaggerated to be controlled. Thus, the soft draw, with a right to left curvature of under five yards is the desired shot for producing longer shots which are less affected by the wind. When I want to hit a sure fire

draw I simply move my head a little bit further behind the ball then make sure it stays in position until impact while making sure that I really fire my right side through the ball and out toward my target. It works every time!

The fade or slice is a shot that is dreaded by the average player but is sought out by many a tour player. A slice, like a hook is a ball that in reality is curving out of control. But, in this case it curves left to right for the right handed golfer. For the average player it is brought about by a number of set-up or swing problems. Usually a combination of both. But a fade is a slight curvature of the ball, less than five yards. The major advantage is one of control because the ball will land softly with minimal roll. Drives can stay on narrow fairways and stay on hard greens. Because the tour courses usually have narrow fairways, high rough and fairly hard greens, many tour players try to hit a soft fade so the ball will sit close to where it lands rather than rolling into the rough or off the green. The negative is that the shot goes shorter than the draw and it will tend to balloon up into the wind. Generally, the touring pro can control the trajectory of his or her shots, and they usually don't need to gain distance like most high school golfers do, so the fade can be an ideal shot for the pros and a less than ideal shot for our kids.

So what then is the ideal shot for high school golfers? Well, according to this article, the draw is preferred, but the goal should be both! A really good player should be able to work the ball both left or right as the need arises. To reach that pin tucked far right behind a bunker, a fade hit at the middle of the green but curving toward the flagstick is perfect. For that long drive into a fairly wide fairway in breezy conditions, the draw might be the perfect shot. At the varsity level, get your players to work on shaping their shots both ways while keeping the ball under control. They will become true players, golfers that can curve shots both left and right as needed. Scoring will become easier and the joy a player gets from playing the ancient game will

be increased. To be able to hit that fade around the corner of a dogleg or hit the wedge down and turn it over so it hits the green, takes one bounce forward then spins back toward the flagstick gives great satisfaction. It just doesn't get any better than that!

Hitting The Ball Down

When the need occurs, being able to play a low shot under a tree branch or into the wind is important to a golfer. There are several methods to accomplish this.

- A) Take a low numbered club. The negative with this type of shot is the excessive amount of roll you will usually get. If a large amount of roll is necessary, then use a two or three iron for the shot, but if the shot length is under 140 yards and the hoped result is a ball on the green, then another method is required.
- B) Hit a six iron. When it lands it will not roll excessively resulting in more control and a ball that will not usually roll over the green. In order to successfully play this shot you need to deloft the club by playing the ball back in your stance and making sure your hands are well in front of the ball. Often this will put your head in front of the ball resulting in a push or sliced shot. Combat this by closing the clubface at address. The combination of your head being in front of the ball and a closed clubface at address will work together to create a low, accurate shot. Also remember that with any low shot, you will want to have an abbreviated follow through. By keeping your hands low at the finish, the ball will have a lower trajectory.

Finally, remember that the harder the ball is hit, the more backspin it will have resulting in a higher flying shot. So swing easier, taking more club than is necessary to reduce the backspin. Following these tips should allow your players to learn to hit the ball down in our always windy spring or fall playing conditions.

The First Tee

Preparing for Tournament Play

There are a number of items that a coach needs to have prepared for prior to the start of a tournament or match. There are also a few things that the high school player needs to do prior to his/her tee time. Lets explore what both need to do in order to maximize the opportunity presented that day.

As a coach we must first do the simplest of requirements, getting the team to the correct location on the right day in time for their tee times. Prior to arrival the golfers should know what position each will play and if play will begin using a shotgun start or consecutive tee times. If using the latter, who tees off first, the number one or number five players? Your golfers should know who the opponents will be or the approximate number of schools competing if it is a tournament. They should also know if the competition is over nine or eighteen holes. Additionally, if you are using this day's competition as a qualifying round for future matches, they should know that up front.

Ideally, if consecutive tee times are being used, we try to arrive at the course 60 minutes before my first player tees off. He/she has five minutes to get their equipment collected from the van and get to the practice green where they will chip for ten minutes. They then move to the practice range to loosen up for 25 minutes. At this point, the emphasis is on warming up, not practicing. Begin this phase by hitting a number of wedges, then work through the even or odd numbered irons. Hit some fairway woods then follow with a number of drivers. Finish up with three sand wedge shots of not more than 40 yards to cool down and regain touch. Then it is back to the putting green to putt for 15 minutes prior to moving to the first tee. A good sequence to follow on the putting green starts with

making a number of three to five foot putts. Then move further and further back from the hole to develop a feel for the speed of the greens. Finally finish up by working on breaking putts in the six to ten foot range. Each sequence takes about five minutes and prepares the golfers for all types of putts. Notice that the players spend 25 minutes practicing their short game and 25 minutes working on their long game! Since with most good players 68% of their shots are played from within 100 yards of the green, the warm-up emphasis should be on that aspect of the game, although some time is obviously needed to hit full shots in order to stretch out the muscles prior to beginning play. Each of the players begins their warm-up period 55 minutes prior to their tee time. Getting your players into a warm-up sequence such as the one above is important because constantly following the same procedure brings them a sense of comfort and confidence, even if it is at an unfamiliar course.

If a practice area is unavailable or time constraints don't permit the opportunity to hit full shots, then we use a weighted club which each player swings for a period of two to four minutes, depending on their strength. If your program does not have a weighted club, the weighted donuts that you can place at the end of the club is a good, inexpensive alternative. Since every course we play has a practice green, the chipping and putting times and sequences remain in place. In any event, always try to arrive in enough time to provide a proper warm-up period for your players.

The players also have a responsibility to prepare for a competitive round. They should follow the warm-up sequence you develop for members of your program and have the proper attitude towards the event. Remember that the vast majority of players are out for golf because they at least like the game. It is our job to interest them enough and provide good opportunities for competition so they develop a love for the game. Sometimes certain players will act out or goof around prior to competitions giving us the impression that they think this is all a big joke. In fact, they are usually just plain scared of failing, and by putting up

a false front, they think it will cover them incase they do fail. If that is a problem with one or more of your players then encourage and compliment them in such a manner that their confidence will increase. After a short period of time you might be amazed at how their attitudes will change as they take the game to heart.

To sum up:

- Cover the necessities of proper course, date, time and other essentials.
- Develop a warm-up sequence which each player understands and follows.
- Understand your players so you can develop in them a strong sense of self-confidence so they can perform from the first hole to the last.

WHSGCA Board Minutes: June

The WHSGCA's June meeting was held at the Northwood's Country Club (Rhineland) on Monday, June 14th. President Bob Lehninger called the evening meeting to order and it was noted that twenty members of the Board were present. John Lonergan and Joe Maloy were absent.

Kris Schoonover gave the college report. She mentioned that next year there will be a separate championship for NCAA Division II and Division III. Also, MSOE and UW Platteville will have women's golf teams this fall. It was also noted that Southwest Tech (Fennimore) has a two year golf management course and that UW Stout is considering a similar course in the future.

The 1999 Boys All-State team was announced by Chuck Menzel and Don Marx. Seven board members, representing different areas of the state, selected the team during a special afternoon session. 39 golfers were selected to the All-State team from the coaches' nominations. There were six golfers on the first team, six on the second, eight on the third team and 19 made honorable mention. A motion was made, seconded and passed unanimously by the board to approve the All-State team. *The Coach Approach* has a complete listing of the

team.

TJ Dieck gave a positive treasurer's report. As of this meeting the balance is approximately \$12,000. Much of this strong balance can be attributed to the success of the raffle and the record number of members in the Association.

Joe Harlow announced the current membership in the WHSGCA is 328 which is up 43 members. More retired and assistant coaches are now joining the association. It was noted that the Board needs to order more bag tags for next year (350).

Scot Meyer gave the raffle report and indicated about \$4000 worth of tickets were sold and that the Association would make about \$3000. This has become the Association's largest money-maker. The drawings will take place after the meeting and would be announced at tomorrow's annual meeting. It was noted that 20 outings of golf were donated by golf courses around the state and that professional Mark Rechlicz was able to give the Association a terrific deal with Titleist. These two aspects of the raffle made it very successful.

Dick McKichan talked about the special awards. They will be presented at tomorrow's annual meeting. It was discussed that only one of the five recipients would be there to receive the award. Those coaches making nominations should definitely encourage the recipient to be at the annual meeting and plan to make the presentation. Kaz recommended that both the nominator and recipient be notified by the Board of the proceedings. Dick McKichan will assume this responsibility.

New nomination forms will be in the next *Coach Approach*. Boys All-State playing nomination forms should be sent to Chuck Menzel while Girls' All-State Playing nomination forms should be sent to Roger Prickette. The Boys and Girls Academic All-State forms should be sent to Bill Berkholtz.

The meeting dates for the Board were set for next year. They are as follows: Fall- Sunday November 7th (10 am) at Winnagamie Golf Course near Appleton; Spring- Saturday, February 19th (9:30 am) at Babe's in Madison; Spring Clinic- Saturday, March 11th (8:00 am Registration) at Western Lakes - near Pewaukee; Summer Clinic- Tuesday, June 13th (8am registration) at Northwoods Country Club- Rhinelander. As usual, the Board will meet the day before the summer clinic.

The next order of business was to set the agenda for tomorrow's annual meeting. The agenda will be as follows: 1) President's Report, 2) Minutes from Last Year's Meeting, 3) Treasurer's Report, 4) Raffle Report, 5) Membership Report, 6) Announcement of Boys All-State Team, 7) Special Awards, 8) WHSCGA Board update, and 9) Other business.

The final part of the meeting was concerned with miscellaneous items. Dave Blake was selected by the Board as the first vice-president and Bill Berkholtz was selected as the second vice-president. Also, there was a brief discussion on term limits of Board members. Kaz challenged the Board to find things that haven't gotten done and to see they are done. Dick McKichan will make a concentrated effort to see that special award recipients are at the annual meeting to receive their awards and Dave Blake will make sure that the welcome gift has always been taken care of for the Spring Clinic.

There was also some discussion on schools gaining advantage over other schools by playing 18 hole matches, rather than 9 hole matches. There was a brief discussion over whether some schools get a "home course" advantage with the State Tournament being held at University Ridge. Also talked about was the next site for the summer's Summer Clinic after our final year at Northwoods Country Club. Geneva National was mentioned as a possible site. Hayward Country Club was mentioned for a future site and the new course at Lake Arrowhead was also mentioned.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn. The meeting was adjourned by President Bob Lehninger.

Annual Meeting Minutes

The WHSGCA's Annual meeting was held on Tuesday, June 15th at the Northwoods Country Club in Rhinelander. The meeting began at 8:30 am and was held prior to the Summer Clinic. Twenty board members were present and approximately 71 people were in attendance. Board members John Lonergan and Joe Meloy were not present.

President Bob Lehninger introduced the Board and, then, conducted a contest to predict the US Open champion and winning 72 hole score. The winner of the predictions would receive a prize at a later date. (Payne Stewart won with a score of 279.) President Lehninger talked briefly about the WHSGCA and mentioned that Dave Blake had been selected by the board as the new first vice-president and Bill Berkholtz had been selected the second vice-president. Also, he mentioned that the board was looking for suggestions for the next site for the summer clinic after next year's clinic at Northwoods Country Club.

Next on the agenda was the reading of the minutes from last year's annual meeting. Dick McKichan an-

nounced that he would save time by not reading the lengthy minutes. However, they were made available after the meeting for anyone who would like to read them. The minutes of all meetings are written up in the Coach Approach.

TJ Dieck gave the treasurer's report and indicated that financially the Association is really solid. The current balance is approximately \$12,000. The success of the raffle and increase in membership have been the main reasons for the positive financial success of the WHSGCA.

Joe Harlow gave the membership report and mentioned that the membership is at an all-time high of 328. Email will help communication in the future. Currently, coaches pay \$20 and retired coaches pay \$15 to join the association. The upcoming Coach Approach will contain the forms to joining for 1999-2000. It was brought up at the meeting that new coaches need to find out about joining the Association.

Chuck Menzel announced the Boys All State team. It consisted of 6 first team members, 6 second team members, 8 third team members and 19 honorable mention. The complete team will be listed in the Coach Approach (see page 10). Each member of the first team will receive a plaque. Next year there will be new forms for nominating both All-State and academic golfers.

President Lehninger then went to new business and wanted to know if there were any questions or concerns. Pat Hauswald wanted to know if it was absolutely mandatory that summer rules be played at courses hosting WIAA tournaments. The answer was, under certain circumstances, no. Discussion was brought up about adding a fourth division. When WISAA joins WIAA, there will be an increase of about 35 schools. Questions also came up about WIAA tournament sites. Neutral courses for tournament sites was mentioned along with a concern of how tournament sites are assigned. Also discussed was whether nine hole courses should be used in the WIAA tournament series. It was noted the Wisconsin Golf Foundation puts up the money so that the State tournament can be held at University Ridge. The Association is very appreciative of this. Finally, it was brought up that there should be special recognition of one individual state champion. This will be discussed by the Board at the fall meeting.

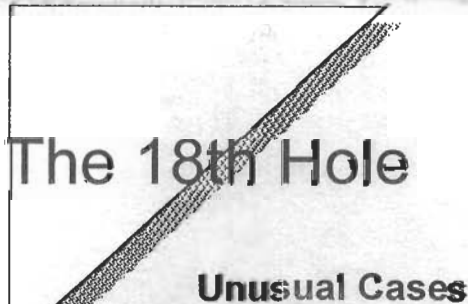
Scot Meyer announced the winners of the raffle. Winners will be noted in the Coach Approach. The big winner in this year's raffle, that contained over 30 winners, was the Sparta Golf Course. They won a set of Titleist irons. The raffle was a huge success and raised approximately \$3,000 for the WHSGCA.

Dick McKichan presented the five special awards and the twenty-five year plaques. The only special award recipient present was Charlie Paetz who received the Friend of Golf Award from nominator Pat Hauswald. Nominators are encouraged to see that their award winner is present at the annual meeting and be prepared to present the prestigious award to the recipient. TJ Dieck helped with the presentation of the awards.

President Bob Lehninger concluded the meeting by thanking many people for their help during his two years as President of the Board. Then, he turned the program over to Tom Conrad so that he could explain the rest of the day's activities.

1. While playing the sixth hole, a player's wild drive comes to rest on the 9th tee in a position where the tee marker interferes with his swing. The player moves the marker and then replaces it after the stroke is made.

- a. The player should have taken a free drop from the teeing area.
- b. The player is penalized two strokes.
- c. The player is penalized one stroke.
- d. The player has proceeded correctly.

2. A player's tee shot comes to rest in

casual water in a bunker. In taking relief from the casual water he lifts and drops the ball in the bunker a club length away from the nearest point of complete relief and no closer to the hole. The ball plugs in the wet sand. Changing his mind, the player drops the ball outside of the bunker on a line keeping the point where the ball originally lay between the flagstick and the point where dropped. He lobs his shot over the bunker onto the green and sinks the putt. His score is:
