Presidents Corner:

State Golf Tourneys Face Changes

Dear fellow coaches.

Two very productive meetings have taken place since our last Coach Approach.

On October 27th, the annual WIAA coaches advisory meeting was conducted. Motions made by the coaches will be acted upon by the executive committee for the 1994 golf season.

The recommendations included moving the girls state tournament back one week and moving the tournament site for all state tournaments to University Ridge.

The rationale for moving the girls tournament back one week centered around loss of school time. The girls coaches who were present expressed concern that the weeks of the regional and sectional also

contained conference meets and some invitationals. For this reason the coaches recommended that the date for the state tournament be moved back a week.

The WISAA and WIAA boys and the WIAA girls tournament will be held at the University Ridge starting with this year's WIAA boys tournament. At the WIAA Boys tournament all three classes will be held at the same site with a double crossover. This means the division I player will tee off on both 1 and 10 starting at 8:00 AM. When these players have made the turn at about 12:30, the division II and III players will begin play. On the second day, the process will be reversed. Financing and final contracts are being worked out between the WIAA, the University of

Girls State Sets New Standards

On Monday and Tuesday, October 4th and 5th, the young women and their coaches elevated Girls golf in the State of Wisconsin a full notch. It was on Tuesday that a team from LaCrosse Central, won their fourth straight title and their playing leader, Erin Carney, by shooting 71-69=140, set a new state record, the standard for all who follow to be measured against.

LaCrosse Central's team of Gretchen Kleven, Tiffany Felde, Kate Theune, Kristy Stokke and Erin Carney shot 659. That is just over 82 strokes per round.

But LaCrosse Central and Erin Carney were not the only stories at this 22nd running of the WIAA Girls State Tournament. Appleton West, who finished 8th in '92, shot 718 and took the runner-up trophy. Bre Pirk, the runner-up to Keri Sawvell in '92, did it again in '93. She shot 77 both days for a 12 over par 154. The third best round in the two day tournament was turned in by Brooke Krause on Tuesday. Brooke shot 37-37 for a three over par 74. This gave her a tie for third place at 157. Keri Sawvell, last year's medalist from Prairie du Chien, played both days with Erin. Keri never found a crack in Carney's game because there was none. Keri finished 77-80, 157 to tie for third. Laura Tzakis from Madison West, played two consistent rounds of 78-79, 157 and also tied for third.

All of the people responsible for these student golfers, starting with parents, swing teachers, coaches, AD's, school people, tournament helpers, WSGA officials and host personnel, Take a big how

Waukesha Catholic Memorial Wins WISAA 1993 Boys State

Waukesha Catholic Memorial registered a clean sweep at the 1993 WISAA State Golf Tournament held at Camelot Country Club, winning the team title and the individual medal. In both cases, the Crusaders needed comebacks the second day to capture the titles.

After the openning round, Catholic Memorial found itself 8 strokes behind Madison Edgewood, 318-326. The Crusaders were equal to the task in the final round, using a 75 by Jim Bodecker, a 78 by Mike Gaspard and 82's by Mike Connelly and Tom Manthe to come away with the championship trophy.

The Crusaders total was 643, six strokes less than runner-up Madison Edgewood.

The fifth man in the Crusader's lineup is sophomore Jack Farrell, who was second low for the team with a 161.

Bodecker came away with an 80-75, 155 on the Camelot layout to finish one shot ahead of Heritage Christian's John Gaschke, at the meet as an individual qualifier, and Shauwn Fredericks of Dominican.

The two players with 156's went to the first tee for a play-off and after solid drives, both added to the drama by putting their secnd shots within 4 feet of the cup. Fredricks missed his, openning the door for Gaschke, who dropped his putt to finish second.

Younger players dominated the '93 tournament. Only 16 seniors participated in the meet. Catholic Memorial will return 4 of its five starters, and 4 of the top 5 individuals, including Bodecker, Gaschke, and Fredricks, will return.

Who is Number 1?

Who is Number 1? In girls golf is it LaCrosse Central? In WISAA boys is it Catholic Memorial? In WIAA boys, who will it be? Who is Number 1? Actually, it's all junior golfers!

Any boy or girl who plays golf is number 1. The W.S.G.A. has a state championship for boys. The PGA has a championship for boys and girls. The U.S.G.A. has a championship for boys and girls. The A.J.G.A. has many national tournaments for boys and girls, as do many other organizations. Have you ever seen how many junior tournaments there are for our kids in summer? There are thousands! The G.F.W. runs a junior tour in Wisconsin for boys and girls. This great organization, made up of the most important golf groups in the state, including your own WHSGCA, has as it's number one goal, the development of junior golf in the state of Wisconsin. In short, there are thousands of volunteers in the state of Wisconsin and across the nation who are working hard and devoting a great deal of their time to encourage kids to play golf, and make the kids number one!

With all of their success as volunteers, imagine what people who are being paid to encourage kids to play golf can accomplish! Certainly as coaches we should be far more productive than volunteers who don't see kids on a day-to-day basis. Yet,

how productive are we? How much of a difference in kids lives do we make? In our hearts, are kids number 1?

When coaches conduct a practice by having their team play nine holes so they (the coach) can play the golf course, who then is number one? When coaches play at meets and tournaments and never watch how their players are handling the course, who then is number 1? How often do we hear coaches exclaim that they coach golf so they can play? Have you ever heard a football coach, wrestling coach, swimming coach or debate coach claim they coach so they can play? There are many golf programs in the state where coaches do just two things: drive the players to a meet, and play golf themselves. Who then is number one?

There may be times when a coach will play and have a perfectly good reason for doing so, but this should be the exception, not the rule! The players know what is what. They see some coaches on the course and wonder why their coach doesn't care enough about them to even watch them once a season. We hear coaches use the excuse that they don't want to make their players nervous by being out there, but if we are on the golf course watching them regularly, it is no different than the basketball coach watching his or her players. The kids get

used to a coach being with them, just like they can get used to us not being there. Would we leave our class room unattended? Why then, do we leave our golfers unattended?

As a golf coach or any other kind of coach, we are educators. As educators we need to realize that the golf course is our classroom. We must make the kids number one both in the indoor and outdoor classrooms.

WIAA Expresses Coaching Concerns

At our WHSGCA November board meeting, the W.I.A.A. expressed concern over two issues that we have been asked to bring to your attention. One or two coaches at the coaches meeting prior to the first day's play were out of line with comments made concerning the condition of the golf course and whether summer rules should be used for play. One of these coaches even went so far as to refer to the WSGA rules officials, who were there without pay, as Hitlers. This comment was so disgusting and embarrassing that we hated to rehash the incident, but the W.I.A.A. officials, WSGA officials and coaches were shocked at the actions of fellow coaches. It is hoped that an incident of this type will never again take place. Remember, at the state tournament we are the guest of the W.I.A.A. and the host golf course.

A second concern expressed by the W.I.A.A. involved the dress of several of our young ladies during the practice round and the tournament itself. There was much talk about several teams attire during the Sunday practice round and much discussion over the dress of just one young lady during the tournament itself. The W.I.A.A. would like us to police our own, but if necessary they indicated they will require dress slacks as proper attire during the W.I.A.A. tournament series. They would like the coaches to make sure that their players are looking their best during these competitions. As educators we need to teach our youngsters that they are guests of the host course and W.I.A.A. and should dress and act accordingly!

Minutes of the November 13, 1993 board meeting at Winagamie G.C.

The meeting was called to order by Joe Harlow, president, at 9:18. Joe welcomed Deb Hauser of the W.I.A.A. Staff to our board meeting. He commented on how well the fall girls state tournament was run stating that it may have been the best run state tournament in history.

Roll was taken and 18 of the 24 board members were present.

Kaz read the minutes of the spring board meeting with Ernie Niemann making the motion for approval and Bob Lehninger seconding. Passed unamiously. Kaz also said that he had sent Arnold Walker of the W.S.G.A and Milwaukee Public Links Association and Mike Harrison of the W.S.G.A staff thank you letters on behalf of the contestants and coaches present at the girls state tournament for the great job they did as the rules officials, donating their time to help make the tournament a resounding success.

Treasurer T.J. Dieck gave his report indicating a present balance of \$3233.13. Motion for acceptance by Mary Beth Nienhaus with Singh Grewal seconding. Passed unamiously.

Guest Debra Hauser of the W.I.A.A. staff graciously gave of her Saturday to be

at our board meeting. She shared the minutes of the Coaches Advisory meeting with us. Much discussion concerning the direction of high school golf in Wisconsin followed. She reported that the Advisory Committee and Board of Control would be considering for approval a change in dates for the 1994 girls state tournament series. Subject to approval are the regional dates of September 28 or 29: sectional dates of October 4 or 5: and state tournament dates of October 10 and 11, 1994. These dates would represent a move to one week later in the season which should really help the unbelieveable conjection of tournaments that were crammed into the final 2 weeks of this past season.

Deb also informed us that the state tournament site for the boys next spring and the girls next fall will be at University Ridge Golf Club, home of the Dennis Tiziani coached University of Wisconsin Badgers. For the boys, ALL three divisions will be playing both rounds there using a double crossover system developed by Kaz.

Additional discussion concerned rules tests and clinics for coaches and it

appears that coaches may be required to attend rules sessions on possibly an every other year basis. More to come on this later.

A final discussion centered on the method of pairing for the state tournament. Kaz asked why there had been no vote on his proposal to pair by team rather than by sectional individual scores since in his mind the team championship was far more important than the individual champion. It was determined after much explaination that possibly some members of the Advisory Committee were unfamilar with the positives of this method of pairing. U of W coach Dennis Tiziani expressed astonishment that the state tournament wasn't already set up this way. He stated that all college tournaments were paired using this method because it was superior to all others. He also stated that at the college level, the team championship was much more important than individual championships. After many questions and discussion Ernie Niemann made a motion to have Deb investigate the possibility of the W.I.A.A. using a team pairing format for the state meet. For the first day of play, teams would be paired by a drawing with four teams in each block. For Division 1 boys for example, there would be four blocks of 4 teams. Teams 1,2,3 and 4 in the first block would have their number 5 men play in one foursome, their number 4 men in the next foursome, etc. Individual qualifiers would be paired togeather by a lottery drawing as well. For the second round of play, teams would be repaired according to their first day team score. In this way, the top four teams from the first day would be playing with each other in the second round. Number 5 man with number 5 man, number 4 man with number 4 man etc. Individual qualifiers would also be repaired the second day according to their first day score. This motion was seconded by Don Marx. It was passed unamiously.

Finally, in an effort to make sure that all Division 1,2 and 3 teams have access to University Ridge for a Sunday practice round, the only day approved for a practice round, the W.I.A.A. will assign teams to practice round tee times based on

the driving distance to Madison. It will not be necessary for coaches to make practice round tee times. The boys and girls are really fortunate to have University Ridge as their new state tournament home. THIS ARRANGEMENT WAS MADE POSSIBLE BY THE MOST GENER-**OUS ANNOUNCEMENT THAT THE** GOLF FOUNDATION OF WISCON-SIN WILL PAY THE \$15.00 GREENS FEE PER ROUND (NOT PRACTICE ROUND) PER PLAYER AT UNIVER-SITY RIDGE SO THE W.I.A.A. WILL NOT INCUR ANY NEW EXPENSES OVER AND ABOVE THOSE AL-READY ASSOCIATED WITH STATE TOURNAMENT COMPETITION. HATS OFF TO THE GOLF FOUNDA-TION OF WISCONSIN FOR THEIR INCREDIBLE GENEROSITY. THEY ARE TRULY INTERESTED IN THE WELFARE OF THE JUNIOR GOLF-ERS IN WISCONSIN! The GFW will also pay greens fees for the WISAA Boys state tournament if they need financial assistance.

Dennis Tiziani, also president of the Golf Foundation of Wisconsin reported that in conjuction with the WISCONSIN PGA and the GREATER MILWAUKEE OPEN, the GOLF FOUNDATION would be combining offices in a building near the new GMO tournament site at Brown Deer Park. Dennis stated that there is a future possibility that this could also be the site for the state golf hall of fame and hoped that we would also locate our coaches hall of fame there. All board members seemed excited by this new home for our honored coaches. Kaz made a motion that for 1994 we increase our dues, they have been the same now for seven years, to \$13.00 with three of those dollars being donated to the Golf Foundation of Wisconsin. Seconded by Don Marx and passed unamiously. Don Marx then made a motion to donate \$500.00 this year to the Golf Foundation earmarked for costs of running the state tournament. Seconded by Bob Lehninger and passed unamiously.

Dennis continued his report on the present state of affairs in the N.C.A.A. and noted that as of November 10, the University of Wisconsin Women's team (three of the top five are from Wisconsin)

were ranked 24th in the nation while the men's team (all five starters are home grown) are currently ranked 13th in the nation. He thanked all the high school golf coaches in the state for their fine work in providing players who have gained national reputations. These players have worked hard to keep Wisconsin in the forefront of golf news around the country.

Steve Stephens, University of Wisconsin- Parkside, gave his report on the N.C.A.A.Division 2 and 3 schools noting that it is a terrible injustice that only Eau Claire and Stevens Point have opted to keep their men's golf teams which means that other than those two schools, the only state supported schools providing golf are Division II Parkside and Division I- University of Wisconsin and University of Wisconsin-Green Bay. On the distaff side, the options are even more limited as the University of Wisconsin is the only ladies team available! WHY HAS THIS SITUATION DEVELOPED AS THE WISCONSIN HIGH SCHOOL GOLF COACHES ARE TURNING OUT THEIR FINEST GOLFERS EVER? Steve was also astonished at our pairing method for the state tournament and encouraged us to employ the team pairing concept.

Tony Coleman, Executive Director of the Wisconsin PGA, gave his report indicating that the GFW/PGA summer tour for junior players was increased this past summer to 11 events with an average field of 112 golfers in five age divisions for both boys and girls. The state PGA also contributed \$5000.00 to the GFW to help run this junior tour. They also ran the Wisconsin PGA Junior at Yahara Hills C.C. and saw the state's largest tournament increase its field by 29% over last year to 271 participants. Jon Dzurbala and Laura Tzakis qualified to represent the state of Wisconsin at the national tournament in Florida. They also distributed over 500 free GMO tickets to those who participated in the PGA Junior and the GFW/PGA tour events. Working with minority youngsters has become a top priority as 60 kids were introduced to golf through a 6 week summer program. The state PGA also supplied clubs to six schools around the state to help their physical education golf classes. With

support like this from our state PGA and the GFW we may have the luckiest kids in the entire country!

Following a brief lunch, president Joe Harlow gave his **president's report.** First order of business was the need to select a second and third vice president. After a short discussion, Mary Beth Nienhaus **nominated Ken Kessenich of Pius XI High School for the second vice presidential position with** the second by Kaz. Vote was unamious. Ken will move up to first vice president in the fall of 1995 when Kaz assumes his second term as president, and the will take over as president of our association in the fall of 1997.

Ernie Niemann then nominated Bob Lehninger of Wisconsin Lutheran to assume the third vice presidential position. A second by Kaz preceded a unamious approval. Welcome to both Ken and Bob each of whom are especially dedicated to their golfers and to our association.

Discussion concerning our Spring Clinic followed with a tentative program developed. We hope to present a 2 hour program on golf equipment from a former R & D man turned salesman from a major golf company followed by a one hour presentation by a weight training specialist. In the afternoon session, The state PGA will present a 1 1/2 hour rules seminar and this will be hopefully followed by a PGA or NIKE tour player speaking on their experiences. We HOPE these plans will work out. Tentative date is Friday, February 25th hopefully at Madison Edgewood High School. Kaz and Steve Hird (the clinic committee) will work out details.

There were no changes in board committee assignments, or constitution adjustments.

Spring Board Meeting at Cherokee C.C. on March 19th. 9:00 am

A discussion followed concerning the first team all state plaques. Last year it was agreed to present them both to the player and to the school with Dennis Tiziani graciously agreeing to personally pay for those going to the schools. We had also supported a proposal to grandfather the plaques to past winners

one year at a time. Citing the cost T.J. Dieck made a motion to donate one plaque to the school of former 1st team all state players and if the players or their parents wanted to purchase their own plaque they could do so at a present cost of \$30.00. This motion was seconded by Chuck Menzel and passed unamiously. It was decided to purchase all back plaques for the schools this year. They will be sent to the principals for inclusion in the schools trophy case. Coaches, if you had a past first team all stater, please look for these plagues to arrive sometime in the first two months of 1994. Steve Stephens of the University of Wisconsin Parkside graciously donated \$250.00 to help defray the cost of these grandfathered plaques. Special thanks to Steve!

The next order of business involved the all state selections for the girls. As always, much discussion followed with the final teams for 1993


