From the Clubbouse:

WHSGCA deals with wards, Honors, Problems

Most of you who are getting the Coach Approach were not at the annual meeting last month at the Springs. I'd like to touch on a few of highlights with you.

To me, it's something special when people are recognized or honored for their contributions to the game. The highlight of meeting on June 16 was honoring Paul Naumann of Brookfield Central and Al Forsythe of South Milwaukee, and inducting them into the Hall of Fame. Both Paul and Al were there in person to receive their plaques. Both were very deserving, and have served high school golf well in Wisconsin for many years.

Also honored in getting 25 year awards were Mark Olson and Dean Molinaro. The friend of Golf award was presented to Racine country club, Meadowbrook, and Rhinelander CC.

The All-State teams were announced and are listed elsewhere in the Coach Approach. 41 golfers made first, second, third or honorable mention. It was mentioned that the quality seemed greater than most years. If you have someone that you want to nominate please get the nomination

form in on-time. One way of doing this is dropping off the form at the state tournament in June. Don Marx or Kaz or another member of the board would be happy to take it. It has happened in the past that some deserving player didn't get recognized because the nomination wasn't turned in on-time. Also, to have a player be eligible for nomination the coach must be a member of the WHSGCA.

There are a number of golf coaches who aren't members at this time. I'm sure there are number of reasons for that, but for the life of me I don't know why a coach wouldn't want to be a member of his or her own association. If you do know a coach who isn't yet a member, encourage him/her to do so. The board member in charge of membership is Joe Harlow, 1015 hillside drive, Kewaskum, WI 53040 – 9107.

Our first raffle was a success. This is our main money maker, replacing the GMO ticket sale. This year we took in \$3,030.00, and only had one prize. The Practice Tee

Turning a slice into a draw

For most golfers, a slice is a way of life. I remember, as a boy, how my slice with the driver would actually end up rolling at right angles to my intended direction. I also remember having to aim left to compensate for that huge banana ball.

And then the shot happened, a driver without slicing. Hole number 13 at Whitnall Park Golf Course. I aimed my customary 30 yards left, but this time the ball came off my driver with no side spin. It went exactly where I was aiming. I remember how scared I was because I could always count on my slice, but now it had not happen. What would the ball do on my next tee shot? Should I play for a slice or not?


I got over my slice by working things out on my own. But you can help your kids move closer to hitting that preferred draw by using the following suggestion during your practice sessions.

- Make sure that the club is moved by turning the upper torso, not by moving the arms. And make sure that your slicers turn behind the ball on the backswing.
- 2.) Have your slicers hit practice balls on a slant with the golf ball above their feet. This is important because it allows the slicer to see and feel the land turning right to left. Ask them to concentrate on hitting the ball like the land is shaped. Much of hitting the ball with a draw is being able to "see" the shot both before the swing and after. The more often your slicer sees the ball turning left the more easily they can reproduce a shot.
- 3.) Work on the slicer's divot pattern. Slicers have a divot that goes left of their target line. It is very important

that the slicer change that divot pattern so that it goes toward or just slightly to right of the intended target. It serves no purpose to hit a draw if the ball starts its flight left of the target! Many youngsters can begin to sense, see and feel a correct divot pattern if you will lay a club down on the ground just outside the ball and have them take practice swings making divots in the same direction that the club is pointing.

4.) Finally, it is very important that at address, and until the impact, the players head must be behind the ball. Only from this position can a player hit a natural draw that does not require an unnatural manipulation of the hands into a closed position at impact.

If you follow the above four steps it is really sometimes surprisingly easy to convert youngsters from slicers to being able to hit a draw. Unfortunately, it is more difficult for adults to make the same change, but give it a serious try if you are a slicer. You just might be pleasantly surprised.

At the turn Annual meeting for the WHSGCA

The annual meeting of the WHSGCA was held on Tuesday, June 16 at the Springs Golf Course near Spring Green, Wisconsin. President Bob Lehninger called the meeting to order at 8:40. Approximately 63 people were in attendance including 13 of the 18 for members. The five board members absent were Joe Harlow, Kaz, Joe Meloy, Chuck Menzel, and Mary Beth Nienhaus.

After introducing the board. President Lehninger gave the President's report. He talked about the two new W. I. A. A. changes and the important role that the association took in bringing about these changes. One change will be an additional girls sectional starting this fall. The other change will be the top three individuals, not on qualifying teams for the sectional and state tournaments, will also advance to the next level of competition. The president also noted that the next two years, the June clinic and Annual Meeting would be held at North Woods Country Club in Rhinelander. President Lehninger acknowledged the W. S. G. A. and Wisconsin Golf Foundation for their important roles in making the state tournament possible at University Ridge. In closing, the president mentioned that the board was looking forward to addling a new board member preferably from a Division II or III school in the northern part of the state.

Don Marx: announced boys All-State team. The six members of the first team will receive a plaque while the six second team members, 11 third team members, and 18 honorable mention golfers will receive certificates. A golfer cannot make the WHSGCA All-State team unless his or her coach is a member of the association. A listing of the complete team

can be found in the Coach Approach.

Scott Meyer reported on the success of the raffle and that next year's raffle should be even better because of multiple prizes instead of just one grand prize. The drawing will take place next year at the annual meeting. Additional prices would include a number of two free rounds of golf and a cart. All members are encouraged to seek out courses that would be willing to donate to the WHSGCA. Call Scott Meyer (920 -262 - 3166) if you are able to make arrangements with a course. It was noted that professional Mark Rechlicz will be able to get a good deal, through Titleist, on the main prize for the raffle. The raffle is our number one money maker and each member will receive a book of raffle tickets that he or she is encouraged to sell.

Dick McKichan talked about three special awards: Friend of Golf, PGA Friend of Golf, and Hall of Fame. He mentioned that nominator's should do their homework first so if their nominee is selected they will have all the pertinent information to give to TJ Dieck for wording on the plaques. If your nominee is not selected, you may re-nominate him or her again.

The treasurers report was presented by TJ Dieck. The balance as of 6/10/98 was \$7,492.86. He noted that the raffle has replaced the selling of GMO tickets as the top revenue maker for the association. Our association no longer sells GMO tickets. It was noted that the raffle took in \$3,030 this past year.

Membership in the association was discussed. Bob Lehninger encouraged more W. I. S. S. A. coaches to join. Also, assistant coaches are encouraged, along with retired coaches, to join the association. The membership dues will stay at \$20.

Gayle Wilfong talked about the W. I A A rule's interpretation meetings coming up this August and next spring and that membership in the association and the raffle should be promoted at these meetings. All head coaches must attend a W. I. A. A. rules interpretation meeting before the 1998 – 99 Golf season.

New business was the next part of the agenda. Ted Devine conducted a drawing for a Tiger Woods print. It was won by Carol Olson of Barron. It was also noted that Dick Heckel of Beaver Dam is looking to start a high school golf tournament at old Hickory on either the last Saturday of April or the first Saturday of May.

Slow play and etiquette were discussed along with the discussion from the floor on Marshalling at the state tournament. Don Marx mentioned Deb Hauser's positive role as the W. I. A. A. representative for state high school golf. The order of play in the regionals was discussed. Also the assigning of WIAA tournament sites and the seeding of teams were discussed. It was also brought up how well many of our former high school golfers are doing on the professional tours including last week's winner J.P. Hayes (Appleton Xavier) in the Westchester classic.

The highlight of the annual meeting was the presentation of the special awards by TJ Dieck. Twenty-five year awards were presented to Mark Olson and Dean Molinaro. The Friend of Golf awards were presented to Racine and Meadowbrook Country Clubs plus Rhinelander country club and Ron Bosi. Al Forsythe and Paul Naumann were inducted into the WHSGCA Hall of Fame.

To conclude the annual meeting, Tom Conrad talked about the rest of today's proceedings. Alicia McMasters, assistant professional at the Springs, will conduct clinic. Then, President Bob Lehninger adjourned the annual meeting at 10:08.

June meeting of the WHSGCA

Chuck Menzel presented the Boys All-State team to the board. The team was selected in the afternoon by a committee representing the board. Six golfers were placed on the first team, six on the second, and 11 on the third. Eighteen golfers made honorable mention. It was recommended that the coaches get their nominations in the on-time. For convenience, they could be dropped off at the state tournament. Don Marx will present the Boys All-State team to membership at tomorrow's annual meeting.

Currently there are eighteen members of the WHSGCA board. Plans are to add 2 new members and replace Ulrich Adams who has resigned from board. The board noted that we need more representation from the North and Division II or III schools.

Special awards were discussed. Nominator's should do their homework first so if their nominee is selected they will have all the pertinent information to give to TJ Dieck for the wording on the plaques. If your nominee is not selected, you made renominate him or her again.

Meeting dates were set for next year. They are as follows: (1) November 8 at 10 a.m. at Mary Beth Nienhaus' golf course near Appleton, (2) February 20th at 9:30 a.m. at Babe's in Madison, (3) Spring clinic on March 13 (8:00 a.m. registration) at Western Lakes, and (4) June annual meeting and clinic on June 15 at North Woods country club in Rhinelander. On June 14 the board will meet at Rhinelander.

Tomorrow's annual meeting was talked about and the agenda for the meeting was set. The president's report will be followed by reports from each Committee Chairman plus old and new business.

The color of the Coach
Approach pages was discussed. It
was decided that the inserts should be
white. Also, much discussion took
place on the raffle, our association's
main money maker. This year, the

raffle was a major success and it is projected to do even better next year. Scott Meyer talked about the raffle having more than one prize next year and that the drawings would take place at Northwood Country Club during the annual meeting. Elsewhere in this issue is a listing of the 1997 – 98 school year All-State boys playing team. The girls team is selected after their season in November. The process begins with a group of seven coaches, Dave Blake, division II and III from the Northwest; Tom Conrad, Division I North Central; Chuck Menzel, Division I Norteast; Dick McKichan Division II and III Southwest; Don Marx, Division I

South Central; Kaz, Division I South East; and Bob Lehninger, WISAA, begin going through the nominations and comparing results. Especially important are the results of the state tournament, sectionals, regionals, Invitationals, and conference tournaments. This committee tries to compare head-to-head as much as possible. After an average of four hours of comparison and discussion we usually are able to create a first, second and third teams plus honorable mention. Not all players who are nominated make one of the teams.

Some years there are several players who really stand out as superior to all others and are easy first team selections. But most years the first and second team selections are very close and it takes a couple hours just to select the first six for the first team and the next six for the second team. Several times the state champions have not been selected to the first team because their other performances were not nearly as strong as of other players. For example, oneyear we had a nominee who finished first in three Invitational's, first in the conference, first in regionals and sectionals, and third in the state tournament. That kind of consistency has to be rewarded!

With representation from all parts of the state and the three division levels plus WISAA, it is hoped that at least one of the committee members is fairly familiar with the players from their section. Sometimes the discussion is a little bit heated, but not too much for we all realize the importance of our job. After the committee has made its recommendations, they go before the full board for review and discussion. Only when the full board gives its approval do the selections become official. Sometimes very good players do not make one of the teams because their coach does not nominate them. That happens too often and it sure is a shame that a coach would care so little that he/she would not do what is necessary to secure a possible All-State position for their player.

As you can see, the selection process is something taken very

seriously by both the selection committee and then the full board. Please encourage coaches in your area to do what is necessary to reward their good players.

Forsythe, Naumann named to Hall of Fame

At the recent WHSGCA annual meeting two former coaches were inducted into the Coaches Hall of Fame. They were Al Forsythe of South Milwaukee High School and Paul Naumann of Brookfield Central High School.

Coach Forsythe was the head golf coach from 1964 to 1992. He served on the W. I. A. A. coaches advisory committee and briefly on the state coaches association board. In addition, Al has been teaching adult golf lessons through the recreation department for over twenty years. He was also a longtime varsity volleyball coach.


Over his coaching career, his teams have won a Janesville Invitational title, a Waukesha best ball Invitational, several Whitefish Bay Invitationals and six conference championships. His teams also qualified for nine state tournaments and eight of his players qualified as individuals. For 28 years Al Forsythe headed the fortunes of South Milwaukee boys golf, always with dignity and much success.

Paul Naumann coached at Brookfield Central High School for over 25 years. During that time he served as coach of both the boys and girls programs. From 1970 to 1997 his teams won 14 conference championships, numerous Invitational championships and qualified eight times for the state tournament. In 1978, his boys team won the state tournament.

Paul was a long time girls basketball coach and over his entire coaching career he coached more than 100 teams, an astounding number.

Today both are happily enjoying retirement. After long careers

they are deserving of time spent golfing, fishing or what ever they want to do. We certainly wish both of them well in their post coaching days. You can see their permanent plaques on display at the Wisconsin State Golf Association office in Brookfield, along with other inductees in the Golf Coaches Hall of Fame.




