The Practice Tee Proper Scorecard Procedure

There has been some concern recently, involving proper handling of scorecards prior to and following a round of golf. Use of the following information by all coaches will enable our high school players to become accustomed to a set procedure. This should help prevent most problems in the future.

Pre-round procedure:

- 1. If you have the time and energy, fill in the name of the player on the first line and the school name on the second line, or hand the scorecards to the coaches as they arrive and have **them** fill in the first and second lines for each of their players. (**Print Please**)
- 2. When exchanging cards prior to teeing off, the players should pass their card to the player on the left. Except in a match play event, player A should not exchange cards with player B. In four-somes, player A should pass his/her card to player B. Player B should pass his/her card to player C. Player C hands his/her card to player D, and Player D gives his/her card to player A. The main purpose for this procedure is to help prevent any collusion between two players.
- 3. If the players are involved in a shotgun start event, use a highlighter to mark the box on the card where their first played hole score should be recorded. Inform the players to mark in the colored box first.
- 4. If playing an eighteen-hole event, and the ninth hole green returns to the clubhouse/scoreboard area, you may want the players to report the nine hole total. Record that score in pencil for the benefit of the coaches. If a mistake has been made it can be rectified following the finish of the round.


Post-round procedure:

Make sure that the scorer has

signed the card that they scored. It is better to have them sign where it says scorer on the card so that if questions arise their signature is easily found, but it is not a rule that they must sign there.

- 2. Provide a quiet spot, away from other golfers, where each group can quietly review their own card, hole by hole. (Obviously in a shotgun start, where many golfers are finishing at the same time, providing this quiet spot is virtually impossible) Each player is responsible for their hole by hole scores, **not** their total score. Usually, this is where there are scorecard problems.
- 3. Since we do **not** want to disqualify our players, **hold them at the scoring table until each card in the group has been checked for correctness.** Ask for help from other coaches in this procedure. They should hold the players until each card has been checked for two signatures, each hole by hole score is correct and that the player's total score is what the player thinks they shot. If there are any questions, hand the card back to the player and straighten out the problem.
- 4. Once all problems are ironed out, the card can be given to the scoreboard recorders.

The only players that should be disqualified under this procedure are those that want to be disqualified! We are educators (coaches) and our job is to help (educate) our players, not disqualify them!

Dean Molinaro, golf coach at New Berlin West High School. (White Tees). Coach Molinaro's team participates in the Milwaukee area "Woodland Conference." They play the white tees for almost all their coaches the work and the coaches are all their coaches coaches are all the all t

the Milwaukee area "Woodland Conference." They play the white tees for almost all their events throughout the spring, until they get to the state tournament series. Dean lists the following as reasons for his conference electing to make use of the white tee markers.

- 1. The courses their conference uses have the following yardages from the back tees:
- a. Brown Deer- 6759
- b. Oakwood-7050
- c. Dretzka Park- 6800
- d. Currie Park- 6300
- e. New Berlin Hills- 6547
- f. Muskego Lakes- 6548
- g. Naga-waukee- 6830
- 2. In their conference format, 7 out of 10 meets include junior varsity competition in dual meets, so the number five-varsity player and the number one junior varsity golfer play together. Since the junior varsity players are not as accomplished as the varsity players, they need to play the white tees, so everybody plays from those markers.
- 3. April and May conditions are usually wet, so courses can play long.
- 4. Playing at Milwaukee public courses, coaches are alert to the fact that they need to keep their players moving along so they don't hold up players behind.
- 5. Some courses may not have their blue tees out in April.

From a coaching point of view, Dean points out:

- 1. Longer courses put too much emphasis on the power game.
- 2. Players should learn the game from the green back to the tee, i.e. Putting, chipping and pitch shots, half swings, etc. should be learned first! If you put the players on the blue tees in April and May, a player will swing from the heels, forgetting the fundamentals.
- 3. Summer fairways are faster than those played in the spring.
- 4. Most young players draw the ball because of wet conditions, but most pros on tour hit fades.

(Editors note: The above is actually reversed. Most kids would like to hit a draw



but can't. Most pros can move the ball both ways, but the majority use a slight draw.)

5. Back tees favor the long hitters, ot necessarily the best players.

6. Ideally, if the conference competition was varsity only, then the length of the course could be adjusted with longer courses played later in the spring season. But, unfortunately, dealing with public courses, it's not possible.

7. The one thing we try to do is to put confidence in a players bag. After working hard on swing fundamentals, swings will be destroyed when players try to hit it hard!

Bill Powers, golf coach at Waukesha West High School (Blue Tees)

Coach Power's team competes in the primarily Waukesha County "Classic 8 Conference." They play the back tees for all their conference meets, using both public and private courses, and blue tees for their invitationals. Thus we are prepared for the state tournament series because we have played courses all spring from those lengths. We try to play all our meets at between 6400-6700 yards. We are trying to identify the best varsity players in our conference, not trying to play courses at a length based on what our poorest players can manage! Why play varsity meets on short courses because your JV or "B" team players can only handle them? You are holding back your varsity players using that logic. Challenge your best players with more difficult courses and place your poorer players on shorter tees. If you don't increase the difficulty of the varsity experience, how will they ever improve? I have found it interesting that our varsity golfers do not hold up the public playing behind them because the varsity players are better than the general public.

I have seen many varsity teams score well during the season from the shorter tees, only to fail miserably in the conference tournament and/or state tournament series played on longer courses, because the challenge was too much for them.

In our conference we play our JV players on courses from 6000-6300 yards in length, although one or two courses may measure 6500-6600 from

the white tees. Those courses give our players a feel for what varsity golf is about. The shorter courses help the JV golfers confidence. When they "move up" to the varsity, they are expected to play more difficult courses because they are now playing at a higher level. After graduating from high school, if they want to play at a college level, they will be required to play even longer courses. Although none of my players has gone on to play at the college level in the last four years, I know from talking with other coaches, that Kaz at Waukesha South has had about 60 of his golfers play at the next level. He prepares them for that opportunity.

The summer tournaments, for the older players are not played at 6000 yards. They play longer courses. Why not get them ready for those opportunities?

On the PGA Tour, power is important. Among the boys and girls in high school, power is important. But, it is not the only part of the game. Long drives are important, but so are the finesse shots around the green. The best players are accomplished at all aspects of the game.

If we play only short easy courses, then the better players often have the driver taken out of their hands. Playing the Ashenfelter Invitational at Janesville's Riverside Golf Course is a perfect example. One of my players used his driver only five times last year from the middle tees. This year, playing from the back tees, he was able to use the driver 13 times. Not being able to use the driver means that the shorter hitting, less accomplished players are more equal to the better player because they can still use their drivers, while the longer hitting players must use fairway woods or long irons to avoid going through the fairways.


I have played University Ridge from both the white and blue tees and there is quite a difference. I am glad our state tournament is played from the blue tees because from the shorter tee markers the finest players would seldom be able to use their driver, and it is an ability with that club that really measures a golfers talent level.

Finally, I know that the All-State selection committee now looks at course

distance when measuring the worth of a player. When a player shoots a 71 on a 5700 yard course and is compared with a player who shoots a 72 on a 6600 yard course, I trust that the committee can see a big difference.

I want my varsity players to have a more difficult challenge than my JV players. I want my JV players to have a more difficult challenge than my freshman golfers. As players get older and stronger we must create the opportunity for them to improve by presenting them with more difficult challenges. Otherwise we are holding them back.


Players should get better each year. I want them to be prepared for success in our conference championship and in the state tournament series. By playing more difficult courses during the season, we are preparing them on a daily basis for the end of the season and the future beyond that. You will get out of your golfers what you expect JV level performances that's what you will get. If you expect championship performances, present them with the challenge and let them succeed!



The selection committee selected the 2001 Boy's All-State playing team during a grueling five hours and fifteen minutes meeting. Obviously, this is a job taken most seriously by those responsible. With coaches from each section of the state on the committee, a committee member saw each player at least once. Most of the players, however, are usually seen at least four or five times, allowing the committee to have a pretty good feel for the quality of play. Unfortunately, once again, a few coaches did not nominate some very fine players, and one excellent player was nominated, but his coach was not a member of the association, so the nomination was rejected. Reminder: A) Nominate any player you feel is deserving and make the committee consider your players. B) You **must** be an association member to nominate a player!

This years First Team includes "Player of the Year" Charlie Delsman, a sophomore from Hartland Arrowhead H.S. Charlie had 6 first place and 6 second place finishes, including a tie for first place and a playoff loss at the State Tournament. His team played on long courses that averaged 6639 yards in length. His invitational championships included the Ashenfelter and the Rainbow Shootout. Other team members include Brookfield Central junior Jon Friess, who won the Whitefish Bay Invitational and was the sectional champion. Seniors Brian Giese of Prairie du Chien, who won three invitationals including the Platteville Inv., House on the Rock Inv., and the Sauk Prairie inv. Nate Colson, of Plymouth, who counts the C.J. Wiese inv., the Green Bay Preble Inv., and the Roncalli Inv. among his first place finishes. Chad Kovaleski of New Richmond won the Hudson Inv., and was the regional and sectional champion. And Dan Pulda of Verona, the division 1 State Tournament champion in a playoff with Charlie Delsman. He also won the Waunakee Inv., and the regional. Congratulations to these fine young men and great golfers. Each of them will receive a special "First Team All-State" plaque indicating their accomplishment.

A recent, somewhat disturbing trend seems to be developing. I have noticed that there are a number of new high school invitationals for both boys and girls that have been scheduled for the same day as already existing established tournaments. Often, it is a school that was a long time competitor in the estab-

lished tournament that has created the new, conflicting invitational. The result means that tournament fields get smaller and more localized. Often these new invitationals involve teams that compete against each other numerous times during the season. Why? Isn't better to involve your players with schools that they may other wise not come into contact with? Our boy's team still competes in the "House on the Rock Invitational" in part because we meet student/athletes that we would otherwise never see on a golf course. Our girl's team travels to Winagamie Golf Course to compete in the Appleton West Invitational because it allows us to meet and compete against girls that we would otherwise not see. Meeting players from various parts of the state is an opportunity that we as coaches should embrace. Don't get local, branch out, see the world, or at least various parts of the state!

With the amount of pressure that high school golfers put on themselves, why do some coaches insist on putting more on their players? I am especially horrified when coaches tell their players during competition what they must shoot in order to win or to qualify. That is a sure recipe for failure. The game of golf was never meant to be properly played in that fashion. Golfers must be taught to stay in the present. Play one shot at a time and add the score up at the end of the round. A basketball coach can work on defense in order to stop the opposing team. What can golf coaches do to stop the opposing teams? Nothing! How could golf coaches possibly know what scores are necessary to win before the competition is over? Teach your players to focus on each shot, then forget the shot after it has been played and begin to focus on the next shot. Thinking about previously played shots is about as productive as thinking about shooting a certain score for the round!

How come my favorite online clothing store <u>never</u> has my size on sale items?

Why does Tiger Woods have to swing so blasted hard with his driver on a par five hole that he could easily reach with a smooth drive and a middle iron? Is there a prize if you hit the green with a short iron second shot? Is there any logic to playing a second shot from the deep

rough? Or, is it just being a 25-year-old <u>kid</u>? Sorry, but I get frustrated watching that kind of **stupidity!**

Keep the ball on the short grass so your second shot is much easier. Ideally, you should know where your shots are going <u>before</u> you hit them!

Why do some Golf Coaches obviously not coach their kids? Once again I saw horribly strong grips that can only lead to disaster. Recently, another teaching professional and I spent two hours working with a twenty-some year old whose high school coach had never taken the time or made the effort to correct his grip. This golfer had such a strong grip that he had never learned to properly release the club. All he could do was hit and hold, hoping that he might get lucky and hit an accurate shot once in a great while. Years of wasted practice trying to perfect a huge wrong took two teachers two hours to begin to unravel. He is now well on his way to much greater accuracy, no thanks to his high school coach. A golfer with a bad grip at the beginning of the season creates a teaching opportunity. A bad grip at the end of the high school season indicates a teaching opportunity wasted. Why waste the opportunity?

Kids need to be constantly reminded about the rules. The van ride to and from meets and practice is a great time to spend 10-15 minutes a day on such an endeavor. It is amazing how little some players know about even the most basic rules. They must know the rules on water hazards (Rule 26), a ball lost or out of bounds (Rule 27), Loose impediments (Rule 23), relief situations and procedure (Rule 20) and a ball unplayable (Rule 28). If your players know those rules they should be able to handle at least 60% of the rules situations they encounter during competition.

The MOST IMPORTANT fundamental you can teach your players: Get them to focus on the target during competition. If they focus on swing fundamentals, they are doomed to failure. If they focus on their TARGET, they will be far more successful! Your job is to see them play and ascertain if their improved swing fundamentals are being taken from the practice tee to the course.

How come you notice that the toilet paper is out when you are at the end of your business?

Remember, your players will be as good as their weakest fundamentals during competition! Turn their weaknesses into strengths.

How come, as we get older and our scores begin to climb, that when we make that rare birdie, we follow on the next hole with a bogey or worse?

Isn't it great that as we get older, we have gained the sense to stop and smell the flowers and notice the beautiful things on a golf course.

How come they can introduce the student/athletes at the state tournaments in most sports, but NOT our golfers? Even in the rare instance that they are introduced, the voice is so quiet that the spectators cannot hear. We MUST rectify this oversight! If you are running a regional or sectional, announce the players. Football and basketball players are introduced.

The All-state selections committee

looks closely at your events course rating and length. Shooting a 70 on a 5300yard course with a rating of 66.3 doesn't impress near as much as a 74 on a 6600yard course with a 72.5 rating. Try to conduct your varsity meets at between 3200-3300 yards for nine holes and 6400-6600 yards for 18 holes. If you cannot reach those lengths, try to have the course set up as close as is possible. It allows the selection committee to more correctly ascertain the state's best players and it more closely approximates the length of University Ridge, site of the State Championship. Regional and sectional sites should also try to have the tee markers set at between the 6400-6600 yard length.

How come when you reach the teeing ground and discover you have no tees in your pocket, there are only broken tees lying around and your bag is 50 yards away?

How come the only time you duff a drive is when you have previously placed your bag 200 yards down the fairway,

while playing the previous hole, in order to save time and energy?

Toughest shot in golf? A downhill lie in the bunker to a green that is quite

Toughest question in golf? Asking for vardage on your second shot on a par three! Boy, that's tough to take.

Do you remember your last eagle? Mine was on number 18 at Nairn Golf Club in Scotland, and my wife never noticed!

Do you remember where and when you shot your all-time low 18 hole score? Quite a day wasn't it?

How much did your golf team improve from the beginning to the end of the season? Using the first 72 holes of competition and comparing that with the last 72 holes, my girl's team improved their four girl 18 hole average by 38.9 strokes and the boy's team improved an even 33 strokes for four players. (387.67 - 354.67) I'll bet your team did even better!
