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The Practice Tee Achieving Success With the Driver

This one's for you Paul!

There are many components to successfully getting offthe tee. They include using proper swing technique, employing the proper mental approach and using properly fitted equipment. We will explore each aspect so you will be better able to help your players hit longer tee shots with greater accuracy. Possibly, you may find this information to be of some help to your game as well.

Using the best technology, which has been properly fitted:

Let's begin with the selection of proper equipment. As each person is different, so too are his or her club needs. This is certainly made most abundantly clear with the driver. It is imperative that each person get fitted for the club that best makes use of their talents. If your local pro has only a few driver options available, look for a multiple manufacturer club-fitting day near you. These days allow golfers to test different clubs from numerous manufacturers in order to maximize their strengths. Club professionals who attend the PGA merchandise show in Florida in January are afforded this opportunity when most club manufacturers set up shop at a practice site in the Orlando area. The pros can then test each piece of equipment to find the best options for themselves. In addition, they learn much about the clubs they will provide to their membership. Let's use the most popular driver on the PGA Tour, the TaylorMade "R" series as an example of how today's club manufacturers produce multiple driver options to best fit the vast majority of players.

The "R" series drivers are new for 2003. They come in three different head sizes (330cc, 350cc and 400cc.), four different lofts, (7.5*,8.5*,9.5* and 10.5*), three standard graphite shafts weighing between 63 and 75 grams, with each

specifically constructed to match one of the head sizes, and an additional 18 shaft options, most in graphite, but a few in steel. How is a person supposed to make sense of it all? Let's take a closer look at the new technology for the 21st century to see where clubs are taking us now and in the future.

We begin with a bit of information about the modern TaylorMade titanium clubhead. It is constructed in two parts. shell and face, which TaylorMade calls Pull-Face technology. The manufacturer uses a CNC milling machine to create an inverted cone shape to the inner side of the clubface before the face is welded to the driver shell. This technology is called Inverted Cone Technology. Taylor Made claims that thousands of hours of computer-aided design work went into this technology. It is a radically new idea, which affects the way the clubface behaves at impact, giving this series of drivers a dramatically larger COR zone. This means that a larger portion of the clubface delivers a COR of over .800. (COR refers to the energy-transfer that occurs when a golf ball is struck by the clubface) The USGA allows .830, which TaylorMade delivers at the exact center of the clubface. In all drivers there is a drop-off in COR when the ball is hit 1/4" or more off the exact center. TaylorMade's Inverted Cone technology better prevents the dramatic drop off of energy transfer on miss-hits compared to other manufacturer's drivers.

The back of the driver contains a hollow area or port into which a "Tuned Weight Cartridge" is inserted. This "Tuned Weight Cartridge" is "comprised of three rods of various metallic properties that are encased in urethane." It allows the people at TaylorMade to precisely weight and balance each clubhead with the shaft being used. Additionally, this back weighting makes it a bit easier to get the ball into the air.

Finally, the TaylorMade proprietary shaft or "M.A.S. (Motion Analysis Shaft) has different weights and flex points in order to perfectly match the clubhead size, head weight, loft and flex of the shaft. The shaft torque of their 70-gram and 75-gram weighted shafts is actually lower than the Fujikura Speeder 757 which many touring pros use and com-

mands a retail price of \$350.00. The use of a perfectly matched shaft to a clubhead produces the perfect driver enabling the user to maximize his/her golf abilities.

TaylorMade thus presents a myriad number of options among their own equipment. It would seem that there are more technologically sound components to the TaylorMade driver than other manufacturer's drivers. Choosing a correct TaylorMade driver that fits you just right is one dilemma. There are many other manufacturer's drivers to consider as well. You might consider the Titleist 983 K or 983 E, or the Cleveland Launcher, or the King Cobra SS427, the Callaway Great Big Bertha II, the Ping Si3, the Wilson Deep Red II, the Adams Redline, the MacGregor V-Foil. How does one decide? The club-fitting day is your best bet. Try them all! Different head sizes, shafts, flexes and lofts. See which one seems to make the ball go the farthest and the straightest. If you are going to possibly spend \$400.00 or more for one club, it certainly better be the one best fitted to your needs. And please don't buy a driver because it seems to work for a friend. Your friend is different from you. Buy what fits you the best!

Using proper swing technique for the driver:

Proper swing technique is an obvious necessity for producing the longest and most accurate tee shots you are capable of hitting. There are several swing techniques to be used with the driver that are different from your irons and even slightly different from your fairway metals. One obvious difference would be the teeing up of the ball with the driver. This teed up position allows you to place the ball more forward in the stance than with any other club because, unlike the irons, which must strike the ball with a descending motion, the driver hits the ball slightly on the upswing motion. In general, the ball should be placed about 1" inside the forward heel for the driver. The ball position for iron play should be 2" inside the forward heel for all irons up through the six, and 3" inside the forward heel with the seven iron through the wedges. The forward ball position with the driver is intended to require more of a sweeping motion than a downward motion. As a result, while

divot is properly taken with an iron shot, there would be no divot taken with the driver.

In order to hit a draw, the player's head should be further behind the ball at address than with an iron. When swinging a driver, world-class players often have their head from 10" to 12" behind the ball at impact. It's what helps these players produce tee shots of such prodigious lengths with today's modern equipment.

What allows these players to generate tremendous clubhead speed is a proper weight transfer toward the target on their forward swing. This is accomplished by moving the back knee (right knee for a right-handed player) toward the forward knee on the forward swing. I tell my students to play tag. The back knee is "it". The back knee should try to touch or tag the forward knee on the forward swinging motion. Ideally, this move is synchronized with the forward motion of the club. If done properly, it creates a powerful force directed at the back of the ball. Once past impact, centrifugal force moves the entire body past the impact area to a full follow-through finish. It is very important that the head does not move prior to impacting the ball. One last thought: If you teach your players to use a proper neutral grip, that is one in which the left thumb (for right-handed players) rests on top of the grip if the club is held in a horizontal position out front of the body, and the club rests in the fingers of the right hand, then regulating the amount of draw is relatively easy. The farther the player sets up with his/her head behind the ball, the more the shot will draw. It is truly that uncomplicated!

While this may be a somewhat brief review of good swing mechanics, they do focus on the most important body positions and movements enabling the player to swing the driver with good results. Certainly as a coach you are attempting to teach your players good swing fundamentals, but proper mental preparation and thought are as important or more important than the other two factors.

Using the proper mental approach:

Arguably the most important fundamental in the game would be to "swing the club at the target, not at the ball!" Mentally, the player should always focus his/her mind on the target while on the course. The practice tee is where physical swing changes are made, not on the course. The key to successful scoring on course begins with the admonition, "target, target, target." If the golfer is thinking about how to swing the club while playing, failure will supersede success. If the player will focus on his/her target prior to every swing, then chances for success are multiplied.

It is vital that players see positive results before they happen. Seeing a good shot before swinging the driver is a product of many thousands of hours of practice, which produces a high level of confidence. Being able to take this very high confidence level to the course in a competitive situation requires a great deal of tournament experience. The higher the skill level of the players one is competing against, the easier subsequent tournaments will be. It is said that one learns to win by putting him/herself in a position to win often enough that self-applied pressures are eventually understood and conquered.

Emotional control is extremely important. Anger releases bad chemicals into our system, which produces a desultory effect on our muscles. We feel disconnected from our body and our tempo disappears. Good players are able to stay mentally strong and play in "the moment" instead of reliving the past. Ask your players how they can affect the past. There is no possible way to change something that has already happened; so good players have learned to forget bad shots of the past and to focus on the shot at hand.

Good players are also better at ignoring bad weather conditions and instead keep their focus on the moment. Of course, practicing frequently in weather extremes allows the mind to feel more comfortable and thus focus on business. Remember, golfers in Ireland and Scotland think nothing of playing in bad weather because they get so much of it. They don't understand the fuss made by American tourists who only want to play in good weather. That is not an example of mental toughness. I work with an older gentleman who brags about not owning

an umbrella or rain suit. He says that he doesn't play in the rain. Obviously he does not compete and is wealthy enough to leave his job and play whenever the weather suits his needs. Our high school golfers are not in a similar situation. They need to understand mental toughness in various competitive situations on the course.

Combine the new technologically advanced and properly fit equipment with good swing fundamentals and a strong, positive mental focus and the image of a great player appears. It takes all three areas to be a successful driver of the ball. To be a successful player, it is vital that the golfer be a long, but an especially accurate driver of the ball. It makes par fours play shorter and easier; it makes par fives reachable in two shots and therefore presents more birdie opportunities. Working with your players on all three aspects will allow them to become much better players.

The First Tee Onducting Proper Golf Competitions

If you are contemplating being a host for regional or sectional competition, ideally you should be securing a golf course that has a par of 72 and plays to a yardage of 5450-5800 for girls, and is somewhere between 6400-6700 yards for boys competition. This would be especially true at a sectional level. What has become very disturbing is the number of tournament managers who, for whatever reason have the available yardage if they use the correct tees, but opt instead for the middle tees which can then create a course up to 600 yards or more short of the desired length. (It would be, by the way, perfectly acceptable to use a course that plays three to five hundred yards shorter if the par is 70.) There is probably only one reason why a tournament manager would opt for a shorter course. That would be to give his/her kids an increased home course advantage. And that logic is as far removed from good sportsmanship as a coach can get. As a tournament host, you should be trying to identify the best players and teams, NOT trying to find a way to give your team an edge over all the other teams! Coaches who are running a tournament in order to give their kids an edge should be BANNED from hosting all state tournament series events.

Why do we want yardages to be consistent around the state? First, it helps prepare the qualifiers for expected playing conditions at the next level of competition, be that the sectional or the state tournament itself. Second, with today's equipment, shorter courses usually take the driver out of the hands of the longest hitters and most skilled players thus bringing them back closer to the level of the less skilled player. Again, you are trying to identify the most skilled players, not reduce the skills of other teams so that your team can better compete! The third, and least important reason is that it does make selection of the all-state playing teams a bit easier if all players are playing courses that are similar in length and difficulty. However, the first and second reasons are by far the most compelling.

Coaches, need to conduct tournaments in a most appropriate manner. That means they present all players with a reasonable test of their abilities and hope that the most skilled team will win. If that happens to be another team and not yours, so be it. Golf is not really about winning, it is about fair play and testing one's ability against the course, not against other teams. Yes, we keep score and compare those scores against other teams scores, but what we are really doing is comparing our team's ability to persevere against the obstacles on the course as compared to other team's abilities to do the same. Those most successfully negotiating the course's obstacles should be the winners. What would you say to your team if they averaged 85 during the season, but at sectionals they shot 300 on a course fraught with difficulties? You sure would be excited and proud of them. Would that change if they finished one stroke away from qualifying for state? Hope not. Your kids are winners that day because they played beyond their apparent capabilities. Not qualifying for the state tournament should take nothing away from what they had accomplished.

We all can learn from others. Take the situation presented to Coach Jeff Trickey of Waukesha West this spring. He was assigned to host a sectional competition. He had never hosted before and asked for help. But what was truly amazing was his selection of a course for the competition. He could have selected his team's home course and even tricked it up to give his team an unfair advantage, but he never even considered the West home course. Instead, Coach Trickey selected a neutral course, home to no one. He reckoned that it would be fair to all players equally. As luck would have it, his team finished third that day, but he never second-guessed his choice of courses, saying only that his team hadn't played well enough to deserve to qualify for state. That, is what good coaching is all about! Select a course fair to all participants, prepare your team to the best of your ability, then see how well they negotiate those course obstacles as compared to how well the other teams deal with the same obstacles. Don't try to rig the course to give your players an advantage. All of us could learn a lesson from Coach Trickey. He allowed the best two teams that day to succeed. That is what being a sportsman is really about. We all need to emulate him! From around the state complaints still

surface concerning players being disqualified from a competition. Tournament hosts need to realize their role on tournament day. Disqualifications should rarely ever happen unless the player wants to be disqualified. Coaches should be doing their very best to prevent situations from occurring which could result in a player being disqualified. Our job is NOT to disqualify players. We are educators. Look upon course situations as educational opportunities. Instruct all players to always play a second ball if they are unsure of how to correctly proceed in any situation. When players return their scorecard, they should never be given the opportunity to

present an incorrect card. Use the following time honored procedure for collecting scorecards.


- 1) Ascoring committee should consult with each group to determine each hole-by hole score on each care is correct.
- Any and all questions should be answered and rules situations should be decided.
- 3) There must only be one person's score on each card being turned in.
- 4) Each player must turn in his/her own scorecard.
- 5) Each hole-by-hole score must be legible.

Only after each of the above five points have been articulated should the scoring committee officially accept the cards. In this way disqualifications resulting from scorecard errors should never happen.

Lets make a real effort to prevent disqualifications from occurring in the future. Coaches are to be ladies or gentlemen in the truest sense of the words. Help all players to succeed. All competitors must be given the opportunity to be the best they can be. Coaches need to conduct themselves properly around all players and fellow coaches. This is go That means that good sportsmans must prevail at all times. If coaches don't respect the rules, their fellow coaches and opposing players, how can we possibly expect our players to do so? We are role models in a game that requires near perfect actions on our part so our players will have proper actions to emulate. Expect the highest actions of yourselves, fellow coaches and all players. Only with these expectations can the game continue to succeed.

- 1. President Dave Blake called the meeting to order at 6:15 p.m. Members present were: Dave Blake, Bill Berkholtz, Steve Lien, TJ Dieck, Don Marx, Sandee Johnston, Anna Curtis, Bob Lehninger, John Lonergan, Brian Scrobel, Kaz, Chuck Menzel, Dick McKichan, Scott Meyer, Dick Vruwink. Also present was guest Tom Schfransky of the WIAA. Of the list above, Scott Meyer of Watertown, Anna Curtis of Holmen, and Dick Vruwink of Marshfield are new additions to our board.
- 2. Minutes- The February minutes were approved unanimously. (Kaz/TJ)
- 3. Treasurers Report- TJ reported that we currently have \$2284.00 in checking and a CD of savings. He reminded us that our philosophy is to give back to as many of the membership as possible. The clinic and the welcome gifts reflect that philosophy. Report approved unanimously. (Bob L./John L.)
- 4. Membership Report- Steve Lien reported that as of May 25 we had 296 members. In addition, some members had submitted their membership applications late. In order to avoid problems with nominations for awards discussion centered around ways that we can remind coaches better. Tom Schfransky of the WIAA said they would help with mailing labels for a letter to coaches. Suggestions also included creating liaisons with each conference to remind coaches on a regional level. Kaz reminded us to reach out to assistant coaches as well. Report was unanimously approved. (Bob L./John L.)
- 5. Boys All-State Teams- Committee chair, Chuck Menzel reported the selections for WHSGCA Boys All-State Teams:
- 6. Academic All State- Bill Berkholtz reported that there were 93 girls from 41 schools nominated and accepted in the fall and 124 boys from 55 schools nominated and accepted this spring. The quality of student-athletes in the golfing ranks is impressive.

- 7. June Clinic Report- Brian Scrobel expressed thanks to Dave Blake for hosting and putting a lot of work into the clinic. Registration, clinic, and lunch times were all discussed. In addition, the clinic portion will include Calloway demonstrations. Brian also showed the board the welcome gifts of leatherette brief cases. Quite impressive. Approval was unanimous (Berk/John L.)
- 8. Raffle Report- Roger and TJ reported that the prizes for the summer clinic raffle exceeded \$2000. Tickets from the spring clinic were eligible to win but the winner had to be present to win. Both gentlemen reminded the board that the raffle is now designed to benefit those coaches participating in the clinics. Unanimous support for the report. (Steve L./Berk)
- 9. **Special Awards-** Dick McKichan reported that the association is honoring 3 individuals and the Waukesha County Park and Land Use Dept. in our special awards this year. Waukesha County was presented with the *Friend of Golf* Award for their support of junior golf throughout the county. Accepting for Waukesha County is Dale Schaeffer. Presenting is Dave Roberts of Brookfield East HS.

The PGA Friend of Golf Award goes to Ray Kizer of Lake Wisconsin CC. Presenting is Bill Alyward of Sauk Prairie HS. Ray has been teaching golf for over 30 years and has helped high school golfers in numerous ways over the years.

Two individuals were named to the WHSGCA Coaches' Hall of Fame. Mardell Allen of LaCrosse Central HS, presented by Anna Curtis, and Joe Harlow, coach for over 35 years and longtime member of the WHSGCA Board of Directors.

The topic of concern centered on the space problem which we encounter in the near future at University Ridge. Currently the Hall of Fame is beautifully presented at U.Ridge. However, we will run out of space shortly. Roger moved that we create a committee to look into the Hall space issue and bring it back to the board. Unanimous (Roger P./ Brian S.)

- 10. College Report- Mike Okray was not present so there was no College Report.
- 11. Web Site Reportreported that Scott Meyer would be taking over the web site. Changes to be made include adding new board members' information and photos, Hall of Fame inductees from this year, changing the format of the forms on the site to pdf format, and linking the site to the WIAA's web site. John has

done a marvelous job of creating one of the most visually attractive sites of all the coaches' associations out there. Any new ideas now go to Scott.

- 12. Meeting Dates for Next Year- The fall board meeting will be November 9th @ Winnegamie. The February meeting will be on Feb. 21st @ the Bridges in Madison. Our spring meeting and clinic will be on March 13, 2004 @ Western Lakes GC. And the summer clinic will be June 15, 2004 (preceded by the board meeting on the 14th) @ Hayward Golf and Tennis.
- 13. **Board Updates-** Bill Berkholtz becomes the new president. Sandee Johnston is the new 1st VP and John Lonergan becomes the new 2nd VP.

There will be a new committee to look into the Hall of Fame space- TJ and Roger, members. Anna Curtis is on the Girls' All-State committee. Scott Meyer is now the web site committee. District 12 representation is being looked into.

14. Old Business- None.

15. New Business- Kaz brought up a number of issues. First, the yardages for the WIAA series of tournaments have not been consistent. We want courses that play in regionals and sectionals to a consistent yardage. Kaz suggested that girls' courses should play to 5500-5700 yards in length. Boys courses should play to 6450-6700 yards. This will bring those tournaments in line with the state tournament in Madison.

Second, tournament courses should be 18 hole venues if at all possible.

Finally, playoffs in WIAA tournaments should be for advancement only, not for 4th and 5th place.

Steve Lien asked about the adjustments for girls playing in the Boys State Tournament. Tom Schfransky replied that a 15% adjustment was made and it was a fair course. We need to encourage girls to play golf. In the current budgetary climate we can't afford to drive kids out. The forward tees are fair for everyone involved. Tom rnentioned that Virginia has done the same for girls playing in the boys season and it has increased girls participation tremendously. We are in the business of promoting golf.

Don Marx suggested that WIAA tournament host schools and courses should be responsible. Perhaps our board and the WIAA can create a written set of criteria. Tom indicated that that would indeed be possible.

John Lonergan had a number of practical suggestions for state tournament procedures.

- a. Make tee times for Monday available on the WIAA web site.
 - b. Print results after the first round.
- c. Find a place on the leader board for top individual results.
- d. Post Tuesday tee times early Tuesday morning.
- e. Create a reserved parking area for school vehicles to alleviate parking prob
 - f. Should we charge spectator entry fees?
- g. What constitutes an electronic device? Some coaches would like to use walkie talkies with ear phones. Is that OK? Tom suggested we follow the USGA's criteria- no measurement devices. Also, no noisemakers such as cel phones, pagers, and CD


Dave Blake brought up some new business. The question of the WIAA allowing us to have a practice round at the regional site came up. Our board feels that it is a safety issue. The players will likely go to the regional site on their own and will drive there unsupervised.

Additionally, our board would like the WIAA to require penalties for the first unsportsmanlike conduct violation. Our board feels that the concern that the WIAA Board of Control has about kids penalizing kids is unfounded. Coaches are always the final authority during matches.

Finally, Dave brought up an opportunity to assist in marketing a resource CD called Golf Guide to Wisconsin. It is intended to be a fund raiser for teams as well as a way for our organization to make a dollar on each unit sold. John, Scott, Sandee, and Brian will test the materials and get back to the board.




but also from Minnesota and Illinois. Unlike what most high school coaches might think, low scores are not the sole indicator of whether or not a girl will be considered for their program. Of course, if a girl is averaging 50 or more for nine holes, most state schools will not be calling her. However, the main question I always ask the high school coach is whether or not the girl is coachable and willing to change in order to get better. Many girls are afraid to change because they fear they will get worse once they are out of their comfort zone. As we all know, their scores probably will increase for a time because of change, but will eventually come down because they have learned a better way to play. We also ask how much they like to practice and play. The fact that our team will practice and play 6 days a week from mid August through the first part of October and then 3 days a week (in a dome) until spring when we can get outside again, tells a girl that they need to have devotion to this sport.

Another thing to remember are her grades. Right now our school is not accepting any freshmen who don't have an ACT under 23 and a GPA of less then 3.2. If she can't pass her freshmen year here, she won't be around to help her team mates in the future. To sum things up for you, the 3 things we are looking for in a freshmen player are: Attitude (are they willing to dedicate themselves to practice and change.) Score (can they come in averaging 45 or less for 9 holes.) And grades(do they have at least a 23 on their ACT and a 3.2 GPA. Just a few years ago, it would have been difficult to find but a handful of girls who fit this category but with the greater number of girls getting into the sport and better preparation on the high school coaches part, these types of girls are getting easier to find every year and a big thank you goes out to all of you for doing more for these girls then just coach-

2003 Boy's All-State **Playing Team Named**

Recently the WHSGCA All-state playing team was selected for 2003. Leading the team is "Player of the Year" Garrett Jones a senior from lowa-Grant, Also named to the first team Are Danny Zimmerman a junior from Middleton. Jeff Kaiser a junior from Onalaska, Dave Merkow a senior from Arrowhead, Joe Pavelski a senior from Stevens Point and sophomore Tyler Obermueller from River Falls. Let's take an in-depth look at each of them. Take note of the number of scores under 70 and how low each of the player's "worst" score of the year

First Team All-State

"Player or the Year" Garrett Jones ha his "worst" round of the year in his first meet in early April shooting a 77 at Platteville C.C. The remainder of his play included 11 medalist finishes with a low 18 hole round of 70 at Deer Valley, After winning his conference championship, Garrett finished third at the regional, first in the sectionals and then he won the WIAA Division 3 State Champion with a 148 total. Garrett, who has superb fundamentals, has signed to play at the University of Wisconsin.

Danny Zimmerman, Wisconsin's only nationally ranked junior player saw his "worst" round at Baraboo C.C. in Sectionals with a 78. However, he shot four rounds in the sixties including a 68 in the regionals and a 68 at Black Wolf Run. Danny was medalist 11 times and finished the season recording a 148 at the State Tournament, good for an eighth place finish. He was conference champion and his four rounds in the sixties tied him for the most in the state.

Jeff Kaiser, the junior from Onalaska saw a "worst score of 78 at River Fall

but had two scores in the sixties including what may be a state record **64** at the Stanley-Boyd Inv. at Whispering Pines. Jeff was conference champion and shot a 143 at the State Tournament good for second place.

Dave Merkow had a "worst score of 77 at the Waukesha Inv. and at the State Tournament. He recorded 7 scores under 75 and finished third or better in 12 of 13 events. He was the Classic Eight Conference "Player of the Year" and conference champion. Only three of his rounds were played on courses under 6500 yards. David won two AJGA tournaments last summer and caught the eye of a number of college coaches. He was signed to a golf scholarship at Northwestern University, one of the top programs in the nation.

Senior Joe Pavelski played in nine meets prior to regionals and had a "worst score of 77 at Trapp River. He recorded two scores under 70 with a low round of 68 at Fox Fire in the sectionals. Prior to the State Tournament, Joe was medalist in 10 of 11 meets. He fired a 149 at University Ridge to tie fortenth place in the State Tournament.

Although only a sophomore, Tyler Obermueller of River Falls is a veteran all-state participant having made the second team as a freshman in 2002. This year Tyler had a "worst score of 79 at Hudson. The remainder of his rounds included a 70 at University Ridge, a 71 at Turtle Back and a couple of 72's. His 144 at the State Tournament tied him for third. For the season, Tyler recorded 11 finishes of third or better. Somehow, he really seems to shine at the State Tournament. How would you like to have this superb golfer back for two more years?

Second Team All-State

A number of the second team members would have easily been named to the first team five or more years ago. Such is the improvement of high school golf in Wisconsin. Members of the second team include senior **John Bailey** of State Champion Madison LaFollette. John recorded three scores in the sixties and had eight finishes of third or better. He had a 154 finish at University Ridge.

Junior Brent Bartels, a teammate of John Bailey, had six finishes of third or

better with a couple of rounds at even par. He tied for fifth at the State Tournament with a 146 including a one under par 71 the final round.

Senior John Hecker of Division Two Pewaukee tied for third at the State Tournament with a 147. He played in 11 events where he finished third or better, highlighted by a 68 at the regionals at Rock River Hills. John will play for Coe College this fall.

A third member of the Division One state championship team, senior Adam Steinhofer, was also named to the second team. Adam had ten tournament finishes of third or better including a third place tie at University Ridge with a 144. He had a best score of 70 at Yahara Hills. River Falls senior, Travis Meyer was a second team recipient. His low round was a 71 at sectionals at Menomonee. Travis shot a 72 the opening round of the State Tournament and he recorded 8 finishes at third or better.

Only a sophomore, Watertown Luther Prep's **Dan Woltman** completes the second team. He played mostly nine-hole meets but did record a 69 in the Phoenix Inv. at Windwood. Dan finished second in the Division Two State Tournament losing a sudden death playoff. He recorded a 146 at University Ridge. His future certainly looks promising.
